Jakob Lowrance Recognized as 2019 Sport Management Student of the Year



Jakob Lowrance, a senior from Bethalto, Illinois, has been awarded the 2019 Sport Management Student of the Year Award. He is an outstanding student (UCM overall 3.97 GPA), recognized for excellence by his internship supervisor, a service-oriented individual with many volunteer hours and many accomplishments associated with exceptional UCM students (e.g., leadership roles). Jakob earned this award while also excelling as an athlete on the Mules Basketball team the past four seasons. In the 2018-19 season he was named a first-team Academic All-American, a feat that has never been accomplished by another Mules Basketball player. He currently ranks in the Top 15 in school history in both career points and career rebounds. Jakob is third all-time in blocked shots. He

has twice been awarded all-conference honors and has twice been named an Academic All-American.

The Student Managed Investment Fund (SMIF)



On April 4, facilitated by Mike Orndorff, the SMIF visited Commerce Trust and Country Club Bank. Commerce Trust provided lunch with key bank personnel, including Scott Stephenson (senior vice president, portfolio manager and consulting), Amy Pieper (senior vice president, institutional services director), and Matt Schmidt (senior vice president, director of equity strategy). They also met with hiring managers, mentoring Ascend managers, and other bank executives and toured their trading room.

The SMIF reported a 22.4% return on assets, year to date. SMIF performance was nearly 2% higher than the SMIF Benchmark, the Russell Midcap Index.

The SMIF also reported 8.2% performance over the past 12 months. This was higher than the benchmark performance of 7.8%.

Gracie Blankenship will be a senior this fall and is pairing her CJ degree with a psychology minor. The Leslie J. McClure Krasner Criminal Justice Scholarship is available through the UCM Foundation for a full-time undergraduate junior or senior student pursuing a degree in Criminal Justice with a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or higher and with financial need. This scholarship was established in 2016 by Robert CJ Krasner in honor of his wife, Leslie. It was first awarded in spring 2017, and a total of seven \$1,000 scholarships have been given to date. Leslie is a member of the UCM Alumni Foundation Board of directors and was on campus for a board meeting April 17-18.

Northern Warfare Challenge – Racine, Wisconsin: Nearly two dozen U.S. Army ROTC teams made up of 115 cadets from all around the Midwest met in February to test their winter survival skills. Teams of five competed in the fifth annual Northern Warfare challenge in a timed 22.5-mile ruck march, including a 3,600 ft. march up the La Crosse bluffs. Team members also carried backpacks weighing roughly 50 pounds while completing the course. Two UCM teams in their first-ever competition in this event finished 10th and 11th place, respectively.

Erasmus+ Faculty Exchange Program

Dr. Marlys Peck in the social work program traveled to Opole, Poland, as part of Erasmus+, a European Union program providing grants that make it possible to exchange faculty between universities. In February, Dr. Marzanna Pogorzelska guest lectured at UCM. In March, Dr. Peck spent eight days in Poland, completing 13 hours of guest lecturing, with students from many of the EU countries. As part of the cultural education component of the grant, she toured the areas around Opole and Warsaw. Dr. Carlotta Kimble is currently on the Advisory Commission for Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology for the Missouri Board of Healing Arts. She is the Vice Chair and Secretary for this Advisory Commission and has been a member since 2014. The purpose of the commission is to ensure speech-language pathology and audiology is performed in compliance with Missouri State law, and thereby protect the health, welfare, and safety of the consumers of these services by people of Missouri.

Dr. Bonnie K. Slavych, an assistant professor in Communication Disorders, recently received notification that Pearson Education accepted her project, "The Voice and Voice Therapy Instructor's Manual and Test Bank," for publication. The manual features an overview of each of the 10 chapters of the text as well as a test bank for each chapter. It may be used by instructors to facilitate decision-making for adoption as well as by those instructors who have adopted the text and want to draw from either the overview or the bank of questions for use in class. This is one of the premier textbooks on the topic of the assessment and treatment of voice disorders in the field of speech-language pathology. At the February 2019 Missouri Collegiate DECA Career Development Conference, Matt Houseworth was named the Collegiate DECA Advisor of the Year. Houseworth is a member of the Management faculty and teaches Leadership as well as Introduction to Leadership at the undergraduate level and Employment and Development at the graduate level.
